Rector's Message

All Saints – The Stats of the Parish

January is always a good time to look back as well as forward. The month was named for the Roman god Janus, who had two faces -- one to look backward into the past and one to look forward into the future. We will be doing a good bit of this back-and-forth looking at the annual meeting of the parish after church on Sunday, January 30.

At that meeting, we will elect new vestry members (watch for

e-mail messages and Web postings about candidates to be announced soon). We will learn about our financial standing, and reflect on where All Saints has been and where it is going. I'll also give my annual "State of the Parish" address.

As I think about the "state of the parish", I thought you might be interested in some of the "stats of the parish," some numbers that paint a partial

picture of where All Saints is at this moment in time.

At the end of 2010, we had 596 people listed in our database, up from 516 the year before.

They were from 202 households. Seventy-nine people were under age 18, a significant increase from the 57 youth and children we recorded in 2009. The adult choir has 29 members.

Our average Sunday attendance was 184 per Sunday, up

from 181 in 2009. But more interesting is that, from Labor Day to Christmas, the average Sunday attendance was 196 people each week. Forty-four people submitted newcomer, and 33 new members officially joined our parish on Pentecost and All Saints' Day.

Last year, 164 individuals or households made a pledge of financial support to the parish. Five percent of them pledged \$10,000 or more, 11 percent pledged between \$5,000 and \$10,000, 53 percent pledged between \$1,000 and \$5,000 and 31 percent pledged under \$1,000 annually.

Of the \$515,428 budgeted for our expenses in 2010, 11 percent went toward life-long

learning for all our members from babies to adults, 12 percent went to pastoral care, 16 percent went to support our congregational life, 29 percent went toward outreach beyond our walls, and 32 percent went toward our worship. (See attached pie chart.)

Those are the hard statistics we keep in the office. Other numbers I wonder about are:

- o pounds of food given away to the food bank or cooked up for meals for Advent House and Loaves and Fishes.
- o number of people in the parish who did some outreach activity last year.
- o percentage of parishioners that reads the Bible daily.
- o number of people who have made major life decisions

based on things they heard, experienced or shared with others at church.

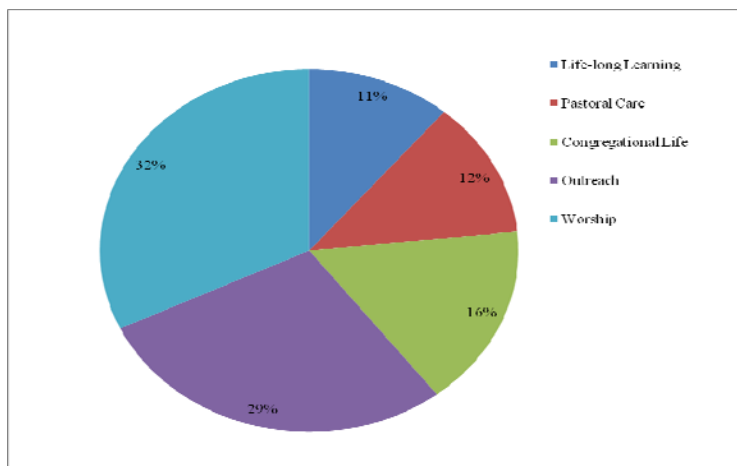
- o percentage of the parish who invited a friend or colleague to worship at All Saints.
- o total attendance at suppers, coffeehouse, pig roast, Mardi Gras, and Day of the Dead.
- o number of people who know more joy, more peace, more inspiration, more love, more hope, more commitment and more connection to God as a result of being part of All Saints.

More to come at the annual meeting! Won't you join us?

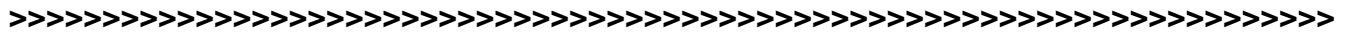

The Christmas season is a perfect time to reflect on the importance of a home – that sacred place where we gather with family, decorate a tree, exchange gifts and sleep in comfort — knowing we are safe, warm and cared for. In our prayers, we thank God for the blessing of a safe, decent and affordable home.

Now imagine a different house. This house has two small bedrooms for a family of seven. It has rotting floors, a roof that leaks and mold climbing the walls of the bathroom. This house has no room for a dining room table, little room for the children to play and no room for a Christmas tree. The homeowners are honest, hardworking people, but their income is too low to qualify them for a typical mortgage. Without a decent home, the family finds it difficult to be productive members of the community, their children struggle to learn and the family does not thrive.

Beginning in January, All Saints is partnering with several Lansing area churches to assist in making home ownership a reality for a needy family in Lansing through Habitat for Humanity. Participating in the project are All Saints Episcopal, St. Thomas Aquinas Parish, Eastminster Presbyterian Church, St. John Student Center and Saint Gerard Parish. We will help fund and provide volunteers for demolition and rehabilitation on a house at 1325 Mary Avenue, Lansing. All Saints is committed to raising a minimum of \$5,000 for this project.

Behind the Scenes: Buildings and Grounds

Many people think of All Saints Episcopal Church as the building at 800 Abbot Road, or the one they can access on ‘higher ground’ from Grove Street in East Lansing. Of course, All Saints is much more than buildings and grounds—parking lots, some landscaping, a multi-level, multi-purpose brick building and a three bedroom home. However, they are, in a real sense, an outward and visible sign of the congregation’s commitment to this community.

A single staff member and a small group of dedicated members lead All Saints’ efforts to care for the property, the building and its equipment and furnishings, but everyone who uses these facilities has a role to play in keeping them usable and attractive.

Scott Hoffman, now in his fifth year as All Saints’ building manager, is responsible for many, varied aspects of the structure. He usually works weekday afternoons and evenings. On any given day you might find him cleaning floors, re-stocking supplies in restrooms, making minor repairs, moving tables into, out of and around the undercroft, or replacing light bulbs. He makes sure that heating and ventilating equipment is ready for annual inspections. He also locks the building after evening activities. Over the years, he’s come to know almost every inch of the structure, but says that he still is learning how some things operate. Ask him about the mysterious light fixture with no apparent on/off switch!

Scott, who once worked as a driver and trainer at GM’s proving grounds, really enjoys the people who use the building and works with various groups to meet their needs for space. He takes pride in doing all his duties to the best of his ability and encourages members and others who find something amiss—whether a malfunctioning toilet or burned out bulb—to report it as soon as possible so that everything can stay in working order.

Mary Anne Marvin, who currently chairs the Buildings and Grounds Committee, has been a member for many years. She thinks that cleanliness and ongoing maintenance are critical and says that it will be **most** helpful if everyone who uses space, equipment or supplies will put things back in order when they’re finished. She says, “In addition to worship and congregational activities, we host many

community groups and events, so it takes everyone’s cooperation to keep things in good shape.”

Folks with horticultural interests plant and tend to flower beds in various locations. In Spring and Fall, the committee spearheads grounds clean up days, offering interested members the opportunity to pitch in with outside work.

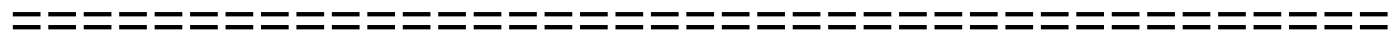

For those whose lives are closely linked with ours.

Every Sunday, we pray for those in our congregation who are ill or in special need of our prayers, for those who are experiencing grief or loss, and we also offer intercessions “for those whose lives are closely linked with ours.” In this and upcoming issues of *The Messenger*, we plan to introduce you to as many of these special folks as we can.

This month, we'd like you to meet Brad McDonald, a recent graduate of Michigan State University who was very active in Canterbury MSU and is serving with the Peace Corps in Albania.

Albania—Can't Believe Voldemort Hid Here!

“Where are you from?” “Why are you here?” “Are you married?” These are the first three questions I am typically asked when an Albanian stranger comes up to me, curious about who I am. I've learned to answer all of these questions in Albanian and even with a little bit of Albanian humor.

To the marriage question, I answer “no,” but then I will be asked if I want to marry an Albanian girl. The answer to this question is “kismet,” to which I usually get a big laugh. “Kismet” is actually a Turkish word that means “if it happens, it happens.” The Albanian language has a lot of Turkish phrases, thanks largely to the 300 year occupation by the Ottoman Empire.

I grew up in the Episcopal Church, at St. Katherine's in Williamston. While earning my B.A. in International Relations at MSU, I participated in Canterbury MSU. It was an amazing experience, and I often reflect on the

good memories that I have from my time there. All Saints is a great supporter of Canterbury!

Albania is mostly Muslim, but I estimate that Pogradec, where I'm working, is about 60% Muslim and 40% Orthodox. I currently attend a Protestant church here and have also visited one of the Orthodox churches. But I still call myself an Episcopalian and I really miss being able to go to an Episcopal Church.

For the Peace Corps I teach English...in varying capacities. I am currently working with three high schools. I teach in one of the city schools Mondays and Tuesdays, in a village school on Wednesdays, and in a vocational high school on Thursdays and Fridays. At the village school Mondays- Wednesdays, I work with interested kids in an English Club. In the vocational school, I am working with a math game that's on the computer and is in English. Never in my wildest dreams did I think that I would be teaching math!! I am also working with a branch of the university, doing a conversation practice with one of the classes for one hour a week.

One project that is slowly developing is trying to rehabilitate a library here. Pogradec once had one of the largest American Corners in the Balkans. An American Corner is a library of specifically English books. In 1997, Albania had a crisis when a nation-wide pyramid scheme collapsed, leading to a lot of violence and destruction. An angry group of people broke into the library, threw the books into the street and burned most of them. Some people here would really like to see this library return. Currently we have two books,

but you can't expect to build a library overnight. I will be working on a grant or two and writing some letters in hopes of finding more and more books for this library project. When I have a better idea of our plan for implementation, and the money needed, your support of this library's revival would be greatly appreciated.
